Young Scientists learn to recognize types of bacteria through the use of a microscope.





To go to school—or to go fishing. Over 250 Hart students answered that question by choosing summer school.



Whatever the reasons were they all reported a most enjoyable and profitable Summer Session—1958!









INDIANS WIN LEAGUE CHAMPIONSHIP-REACH C.I.F. SEMI-FINALS

When the Hart Indians smothered Fillmore 25-0 before 4000 screaming fans at the homecoming game they climaxed Hart's greatest regular season of play. With such stars as Jim Bottoms, John Sheeler, and John Reid leading the way, the Tribe won 11 straight before losing 14-6 to San Marino.


In seasonal scoring the Indians racked 379 points while allowing only 46 points to be scored. In the league it was 202-12, the 12 points gained by Nordhoff.

Most points scored by Hart in one game was the 62-0 victory over Carpinteria and the least was in the San Marino loss. San Marino also scored the most against the Indians, but Hart chalked up six shut-outs.

All in all, 56 Indian TD's were scored and Dave Jones converted 43 times. Hart was trapped once for a two-point safety.

Because of Hart's great regular season record of 9 wins and no losses, the Los Angeles Examiner rated the squad as the best of the Class AA small school football teams.

Operating a UCLA-type single wing the Indians proved they were no team to be ignored. Newhall could also fling the pigskin for large gains. The passing and running together put the Tribe in the 200 yards gained bracket in most contests. Against Fillmore 315 yards gained with 69 in the air.









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












The varsity racket squad under the direction of coach Rump, has, so far this year, been a credit to Hart. Although not in league play, the squad has won a major per cent of its matches.

At press time the tennis team looks as if it may be on the way toward league championship.










It brought long and loud applause as they drew the curtains on the final scene. Everyone enjoyed the rollicking comedy and fine acting of members of the Junior Class.




