> Re: Cultural Resources Evaluations for the County of Los Angeles The Old Road Over Santa Clara River & SPT Co Bridge Project

Dear Ms. Mello:

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the above-referenced project. The project site is located in the Santa Clara River corridor at Castaic Junction, which is a highly sensitive area in terms of prehistoric and historic cultural resources. The project is proximate to the site of a Tataviam Indian Village, Chaguayabit, aka Tsawayung, which was occupied until at least A.D. 1802 and whose influence extended several miles in each direction along the river.

Cultural materials and human remains have been "discovered" in the area for 100-plus years by both and amateurs and professionals. One notable recent discovery was (re)made during a Caltrans road widening project at the site previously recorded as CA-LAN-2233 (and -2234 and -2235), aka Chiquito Creek site (see map), which yielded 45 inhumations (2000-1630 B.P.) at the confluence of San Martinez Grande Canyon Road and Highway 126. Waugh 2003 ("Prehistory in the Transverse Ranches of California: An Archaeological Investigation in the Santa Clara River Valley" by Georgie Waugh, UC Sacramento, 2003) describes the sites and is a good resource for other known sites in the area.

The nearby Bowers Cave site, CA-LAN-36, was likely associated with

Chaguayabit village, whose inhabitants deposited important sacred objects there circa A.D. 1802-1811.

One site demonstrating the geographical extent of influence of Chaguayabit village is the "Hydraulic Research" site on Rye Canyon Road in Valencia, where human remains and cultural materials were found during construction in 1968. The Hydraulic Research site is roughly equidistant from Castaic Junction as the Chiquito Creek site, in the opposite direction. In the cultural-paleontological section of The Newhall Land and Farming Co.'s Newhall Ranch EIR (Whitley & Simon 1996), archaeologists David Whitley and Joe Simon describe human remains from one individual that were found along the riverbank near Castaic Junction. Whitley and Simon postulate the remains were likely those of a victim of the 1928 St. Francis Dam Disaster, which devastated the area.

Extra precautions should be taken during ground disturbance, and the Fernandeno-Tataviam Band of Mission Indians (818-837-0794) should be given the opportunity to provide a Native American monitor during any such activity.




Figure 1.2. Project Location.
