




HALFBACK-END JIM STEFFEN

Improving Bruins Try for an Upset

A couple of angry and aroused football teams will do battle here in Strawberry Canyon this afternoon in the 29th renewal of this series between the University of California giants.

The favored Bears, rudely knocked off by Oregon State last week, hope to keep their Rose Bowl fire from dying out completely—and also to break a seven-game losing streak to their Westwood brothers.

The underdog Bruins, the loser in five out of seven starts this fall, hope to spring a major upset—and that is exactly what it would be, a big fat, juicy upset! If they can surprise their Berkeley brothers, the Bruins will not only even this series at 14-14-1 but also will post their fourth straight win here in Memorial Stadium, a feat never before accomplished.

UCLA, accustomed to winning with regularity under the late and great Red Sanders, has been having its troubles this season for a number of obvious reasons, the loss of the Single Wing Master himself two short weeks before fall practice opened, the illness of his successor George Dickerson, the loss at midseason of seven first stringers the penalized seniors

—and, of course, the Bruins have fallen before five pretty good football teams in Pitt, Oregon State, Florida, Stanford and Washington State.

From Acting Head Coach Bill Barnes and Captain Jim Steffen down to the sophomore student managers, the Bruins feel they are ready for an all-out effort this afternoon, certainly an improved performance over last week when they gave away three quick and easy touchdowns to Washington State to lose a 38-20 ball game.


Early in the third quarter, the Bruins TWICE climbed to within one TD of WSC, 8 14 and 14-22, only to have the Cougars explode for quick tallies, one on a 66-yard pass play and the other on a 83-yard kickoff return. A short 31-yard UCLA punt to its own 33 set up the Cougar clincher in the wild five-teedee third period—and that was that.

But there was one bright side to the WSC defeat—the emergence of a new tailback star by the name of Nathan "Skip" Smith, a converted 193-pound fullback who showed he can really pack the pigskin. He rambled for 135 net yards in 22 carries for a solid 6 3 average and a TD. Pretty impressive stats for a gridder who had only carried the ball ONCE prior to last Saturday!

Skip, a junior from Torrance, has the speed and drive to be a star if he can improve his passing—and Coach Barnes say he believes this Mr Smith can do just that. After all, he was only moved to tailback the Monday before the WSC

game. A Bruin to watch closely today—Nathan DeLynn Smith, No. 24.

Then there is another new tailback who figures to help out today for the first time since the Oregon State game Oct. 4 when he cracked his wrist. He's No. 17, Bill Kilmer a talented sophomore from Azusa who reminds fans of the former Bruin All-American Paul Cameron, especially his running style.

Chuck Kendall, a clever senior who is handicapped by a knee condition, will probably start today but Skip Smith and Kilmer are ready to step in and do a job—plus another senior named Kirk Wilson, who showed signs last week of coming to life after a slow start this season.

The 1958 Bruins also have other capable performers—but are lacking in over-all depth and experience, especially since the penalized seniors have been sidelined.

John Henry Brown is a fine pass receiving end who goes into today's game with 15 catches to his credit. There is no more hard-nosed competitor in the PCC than Captain Stef fen at end. Fullbacks Ray Smith and Gene Gaines run with authority Wingbacks Phil Parslow and Marv Luster have good speed. Blocking Backs Dave Peterson all 169 pounds of him and Art Phillips do a good job.

The Bruin forward wall is lacking in over-all size but Bob King Joe Harper and Rod Cochran are tough competitors at guard. Sophomore Harry Baldwin is a comer at center UCLA is hurting at tackle but Trusse Norris, a converted end, and lettermen Paul Oglesby and Jim Wallace have the ability to do a job. Tony Longo, who was making giant strides at tackle, is probably out of today's game with an elbow injury

If these aforementioned Bruins play their top games today, Mr Kapp & Co. could have a mighty busy afternoon. They may have lost five games but their spirit and desire is still high, especially for this big battle with Brother Bear

Parting shot: UCLA has won two out of three games on the road this season. Can they make it three out of four here in Strawberry Canyon this afternoon? It doesn't figure but stranger things happen every Saturday in this wonderful game of intercollegiate football.




QUARTERBACK JOE KAPP

Bears Aim for Fourth Conference Victory

Another round in the wide-open scramble for the Pacific Coast Conference football title will be staged today when Coach Pete Elliott's California Bears entertain Brother Bruin from Westwood in the annual All-University Week End battle.

The Golden Bears, toppled from the PCC lead last Saturday by Oregon State's Beavers, will be favored over a young Bruin team bent on playing the spoiler's role in California's bid for its first Conference football title since 1950.

California (3 1) will be pointing for its fourth conference victory today as the Bears try to keep pace with the conference-leading Beavers 4-1) who are meeting the Washington State Cougars 4-2), another title hopeful, in Pullman. Southern California's Trojans (3 2), who meet Washington in Los Angeles, also figure in the championship picture. A Bear victory today, coupled with a WSC win, would regain sole possession of Conference leadership for California.


Aside from the fight for PCC honors, the Golden Bears will be attempting to end UCLA's domination of the Bear-Bruin rivalry. The Bruins have whipped the Bears seven straight times since 1950 when California earned a 35-0 decision. California still leads the intra-University competition with 14 victories to UCLA's 13. One contest, the 1933 inaugural of the series, ended in a tie.

The Bears and the Bruins have met two common opponents in Washington State and Oregon State. California routed WSC, 34-14, and lost to OSC, 14-8, while the Uclans lost to both the Cougars (38 20) and the Beavers (14-0)

All American quarterback nominee Joe Kapp will direct the Bears' bid to break UCLA's victory string against California. In victory and defeat, Joe has earned praise for his outstanding play Joe leads the

Jones, a Senior letterman from Oakland has been one of the standouts in the Bear line. Terry a 5'11'' 200-pounder started the season at guard but he was shifted to the No. I center assignment when Frank Doretti was injured An outstanding linebacker Jones is a very good defensive player

PCC in total offense with 813 yards on 156 plays for a 521 yard-per-play average. He has rolled up 437 yards rushing on 94 carries, averaging 4.65 yards per try. In the passing department, Joe has thrown 62 times in seven games with 35 completions good for 376 yards. Kapp's 56.4 per cent completion average ranks with the PCC's leaders.

Bill Patton, the Bears' fine Sophomore fullback, suffered an injury in the OSC game and is a doubtful participant today Junior Jack Yerman or Soph Walt Arnold will probably fill Patton's starting berth. Yerman, with his great speed is a breakaway threat. Jack has carried the ball 17 times for 122 yards, averaging 7 18 yards per carry Soph Walt Arnold, a fine runner, has averaged 3 60 yards per try

Senior left halfback Hank Olguin is also on the injury list, but Soph Wayne Crow has been doing an excellent job in Hank's spot. Wayne has netted 154 yards on 37 carries for a 4.16 yard-per-play average. Grover Garvin, a promising J C. transfer, who has been hampered by injuries, may get the starting call today Right half Jack Hart has been one of the Bears' most reliable performers. Jack has packed the ball 78 times for 248 yards (3.90 yards per play) A fine all-around player, Hart also leads the team in pass receptions with 16 for 212 yards and one TD.

The Bear line, which played an outstanding game against OSC, will line up with ends Charlie Holston 210) and Tom Bates (200), tackles Frank Sally (215) and Pat Newell 185), guards Pete Domoto (189) and Don Piestrup (180) and center Terry Jones 200) Center Frank Doretti, sidelined by an injury two weeks ago, is still doubtful. The second unit includes ends Jerry Lundgren 185) and Skip Huber 190), tackles Bill Streshly (225) and John Michael 220), guards Jim Green (215) and Jeff Snow (195) and center Andy Segale (200)



PENALTIES

- OFFSIDE by either team; Violation of scrimmage or free kick formation; Encroachment of neutral zone—Loss of Five Yards.
- 2. ILLEGAL PROCEDURE, POSITION OR SUB-STITUTION—Putting ball in play before Referee signals "Ready-for-play"; Failure to complete substitution before play starts; Player out of bounds when scrimmage begins; Failure to maintain proper alignment of offensive team when ball is snapped; False or simulating start of a play; Taking more than two steps after Fair Catch is made; Player on line receiving snap—Loss of Five Yards.
- 3. ILLEGAL MOTION—Offensive player illegally in motion when ball is snapped—Loss of Five Yards.
- 4. ILLEGAL SHIFT—Failure to stop one full second following shift—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
- 5. ILLEGAL RETURN of substitute not previously disqualified—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
- 6. ILLEGAL DELAY OF GAME; Taking more than four times out during either half (except for replacement of injured player)— Loss of Five Yards. Team not ready to play at start of either half—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
- 7. Interference by defensive team on forward pass—Passing Team's Ball at Spot of Foul and First Down.
- 15. INELIGIBLE RECEIVER DOWNFIELD ON PASS—Loss of Fifteen Yards.
- 16. BALL ILLEGALLY TOUCHED, KICKED OR BATTED—Forward pass being touched by ineligible receiver beyond the line of scrimmage—Loss of Fifteen Yards from Spot of Preceding Down and Loss of a Down. Eligible pass receiver who goes out of bounds and later touches a forward pass—Loss of Down. Illegal touching of kicked ball within opponent's ten yard line—Touchback.
- 17. PENALTY DECLINED; Incomplete forward pass; No play or no score.
- CRAWLING by runner—Loss of Five Yards.
 Interlocked interference Loss of Fifteen Yards.



STADIUM INFORMATION SERVICE

LOST AND FOUND ARTICLES

First aid may be obtained at the emergency rooms marked on the map of the stadium.


POLICE STATION
