Funeral Services for Mrs. L. Pruitt, Prominent Leader, To Be Held on Thursday

Mrs. Loretta Dunn Pruitt, well known religious, educational and civic leader passed away on April 6 at the White Memorial hospital. Her death came after a brief illness and was a shock to the entire city.

Born near Monroe, Louisiana, Mrs. Pruitt was the first woman to receive an A. B. degree from Leland University in New Orleans. She taught music in the public schools for many years and later succeeded her late husband as first woman principal of the public school at Monroe.

She is known throughout Texas and California for her service to humanity and her devotion to her church. Mrs. Pruitt was editor of the District Baptist paper and secretary of Churches of Christ Holiness under Bishop C. P. Jones.

On her arrival in Los Angeles, she purchased valuable property at the corner of 23rd and Hooper avenue.

She is survived by three daughters, Mesdames Ursula Adams, Marcia Bauman, Portia Lewis; three sons, Dr. Euclid M. Pruitt, Montcalm and L'Overture; three granddaughters, two grandsons and many other relatives, among those five brothers of whom reside in Chicago and Bishop Hudson Dunn of Norfolk, Virginia.

Featuring a rousing program of entertainment, recreational games and notables from civic, social and theatrical circles, the citizens' committee of Val Verde County Park opening announces this week that all Los Angeles County is invited to participate in the gala celebration of the cornerstone laying of the pool and bath house, which is scheduled for Sunday, April 16, at 2 p. m.

According to Norman O. Houston chairman of the committee, the entire band of Jefferson high school will furnish music throughout the afternoon program.

Also at the invitation of the committee, the following motion picture and stage notables will be distinguished guests: Miss Hattie McDaniel, Clinton Rosemond, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Whitman, the Brown sisters, Miss Ruby Elzy, Jack Carr and the Million Dollar Production Co. stars.

Supervisor Gordon L. McDonough, who is chiefly credited with

having pushed the county plans for improvements in the new suburban community through, will officiate at the cornerstone ceremonies. Assisting him will be other notables from the state, county and city offices.

Nate George, well known for his athletic direction, will have charge of all recreational games on that day.

**HEALTHFULNESS OF COOKED VEGETABLES
RETAINING NATURAL JUICES PRAISED**

"Foods cooked in their own juices retain health-giving elements and vitamins," says Ann Martin, widely known Los Angeles home economist. "When foods are boiled, many essential properties are released to be taken up by the water, and a large part of the food value is poured down the sink when the water is drained off."

The surest way to preserve these valuable food qualities, according to Miss Martin, is to depend upon the automatically controlled heat of an electric range, eliminating the necessity for large quantities of water for tempering as in older cooking methods.

Citing the potato as one vegetable in particular, Ann Martin explains that 16 elements important to the health and growth of the human body are present in the potato when it is taken from the ground. "These health minerals may be likened to common table salt," Miss Martin stated. "Such salt will dissolve in a glass of hot water. Similarly, these minerals will dissolve in boiling water if it surrounds the potato, and be lost completely when that water is discarded. With potatoes, or any vegetable, cooked the electric waterless way, the full value is retained."

"To put it another way," Ann Martin continues, "one of us would throw away the cream and serve skimmed milk to the family. It's just as illogical to waste the rich liquid from vegetables and serve the remaining pulp to the family, when cooking the electric way will conserve all these health benefits."

Miss Martin's opinion is supported by the practice of doctors in recommending for convalescents broth made from meat and vegetables

slowly cooked in water. The liquid, which has absorbed the healthful food elements, is then served to the patient.

"Members of the family also will enjoy their food more because full flavor is retained when prepared the electric way," she says. "Too, nourishing, delicious juices are sealed in meats when roasted in the flameless heat of an electric oven."

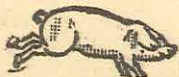

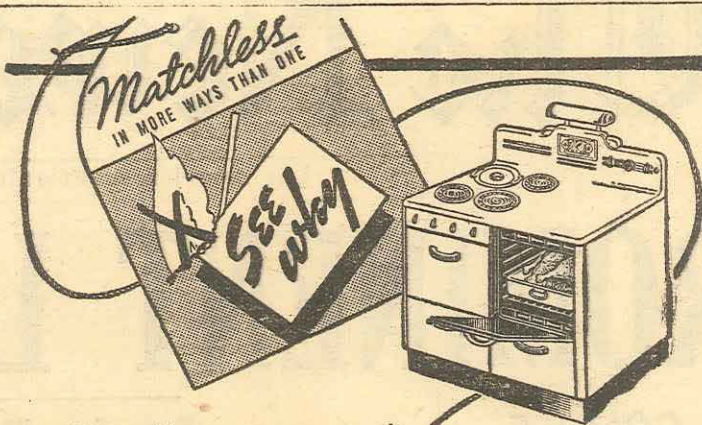

The boys aren't required to be soothsayers; all Michael Jacobs asks is that they drum up interest in the forthcoming bout so that the turnstiles and cash registers will click. If this means that some of them have to pick Galento to win, well, that's too bad. Latest to join the chorus is Jess Willard, who was cut down at Toledo by Jack Dempsey.

"You watch this Galento," opines Willard, taking a sizeable puff at his heater. "He is pretty strong and will take all that Louis hands out. If he hits Louis, Louis will go down."

I have a mental picture of the hours of agony Willard went through in preparing this commendation of Galento.

"Jess, will you say something about Galento?" asks Mike Jacobs. "You know, something that will make the sucker think that maybe Tony has a chance."

This is a big job and it isn't hard to see that Jess could have spent hours chewing the end of his oversharp while he composed the literary masterpiece listed above.

The other ex-champions follow a similar route.

"Now as for me," comments Jack Dempsey, "there is no doubt that Louis is very good. On the other hand, Galento is very powerful. It will be a very interesting bout, hmmm, very interesting, indeed. You may quote me to that effect."

"There is a strong likelihood that Louis will win," adds Gene Tunney. "Then again, it may rain. Who knows? If Louis stumbles, I believe it is just possible that he may fall down. However, Galento's left does not impress me. Just the same, it will be a great fight and everybody should go."

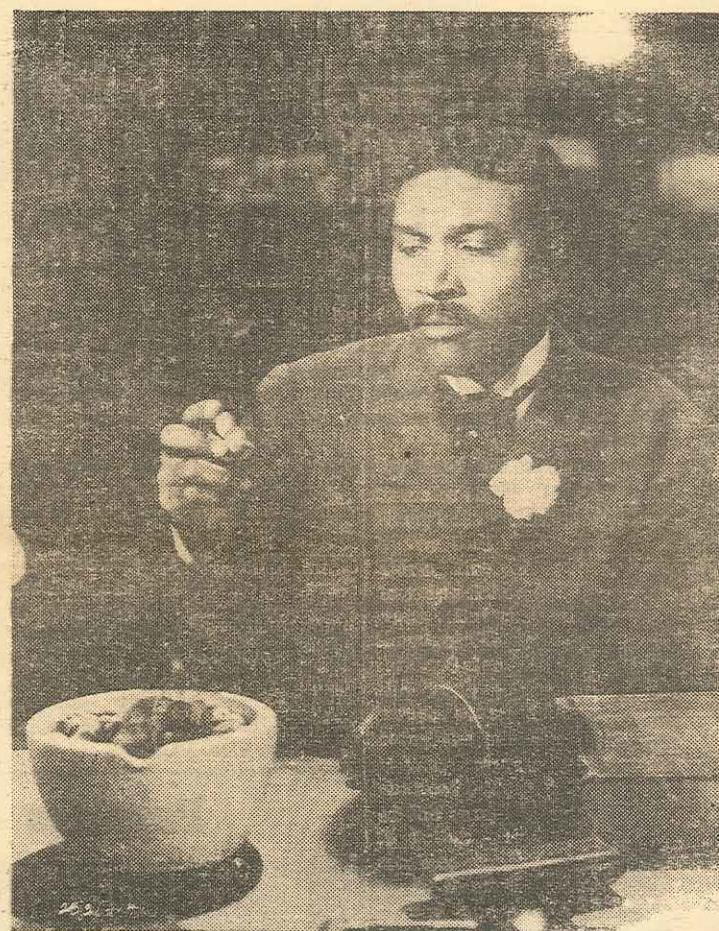
Why won't Galento stand a chance? Take a look at any one of the camera shots of Phony Tony in action. His fighting stance resembles that of a member of the U. S. Semaphore Corps—both legs spread and the arms out wide in imitation of a Dutch windmill. Then have a substantial gander at the list of 22 stumblebums who have beaten him in the course of his checkered career. In widely separated sections of this country, two significant religious meetings were held Tuesday—one in Los Angeles and the other in Atlanta, Georgia. In Los Angeles, at the quarterly meeting of the Presbytery, the Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles expressed hope and enthusiastic support for the merger of these two great denominations, the Episcopal and Presbyterian Churches.

For the cause of Christ, the Episcopal Church, with its long line of apostolic succession running back to Polycraft, with its leadership and religious preeminence, is willing to bury Calvin's hatchet of predestination and unite with the other laborers in the vineyard in order to promote the kingdom of God on earth.

The other meeting was held in Atlanta by a laymen's committee seeking legal steps to prevent the merging of three branches of the Methodist Church on the old ground of Negro integration.

The Episcopal and Presbyterian Churches have a number of Negro communicants, outstanding laymen, elders, priests and bishops. This Christian fellowship has enhanced the usefulness of these churches rather than retarded their progress. The northern branch of the Methodist Church also has its Negro group, and no one can deny that it is a powerful instrument for good. But bigots and sanctimonious hypocrites, whose souls are steeped in religious prejudice, would lay obstacles in the path of this great church in its effort to broaden its scope of influence and helpfulness to the world.

In this year of our Lord, when every device of man has failed to bring peace on earth, the Cross of Christ is being tested as never before. Those who would oppose the preaching of the Gospel on equality to all races of mankind are just as guilty of hatred and intolerance as the tyrants who trample little nations under foot, and those who pillage and desecrate the temple of God.

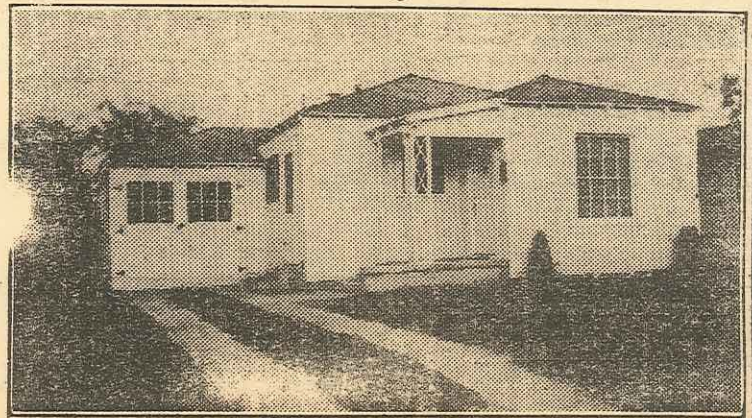
