



























HISTORICAL SKETCH










A decade ago the communities of Newhall-Saugus-Valencia voted to establish their own community college district. On the same ballot a five-person Board of Trustees was elected.


Among the Board's early decisions was the naming of the Santa Clarita Community College District and selection of Dr. Robert C. Rockwell as District Superintendent, effective July, 1968.

While the District looked for and then purchased the permanent 158 acre site on Valencia Blvd., College of the Canyon's first classes were held September 5, 1969, at Wm. S. Hart High School. And despite the difficulties of adjusting the new college's schedule around high school life, 735 students enrolled to make up the first COC student body.

College of the Canyon's real home took form in temporary facilities fabricated in August of 1970. The first day and evening classes on the Cougar campus began October 5, 1970. By February, 1972, the fledgling college had won full accreditation.









Construction of permanent facilities began in 1972-73 year with the Dr. Wm. G. Bonelli Center for Instructional Resources, now commonly known as the IRC Building. Maintenance and operations buildings were erected also to insure smooth operation of the campus. Three additional buildings were planned to meet the growing campus needs for classrooms, offices, labs, and student government. With the help of enthusiastic, hardworking campus and community campaigners, an \$8,000,000 bond issue was passed in February of 1973.

By January of 1974, students were enjoying the modern fully-equipped facilities of the Bonelli Center. Governor Ronald Reagan dedicated the building during formal ceremonies conducted April 22, 1974.

COC's campus is now complete and includes a technical center, student center, gymnasium, classroom and laboratory cen-


































ters. Our community is realizing the asset of having this campus close to home. The college also provides non-credit short courses to all age groups.


COC is more than half way to it's projected enrollment of 500 students. The certificated staff has more than doubled and the classified staff has grown from eight to over 50.

More than 3,000 students are enrolled in COC's college transfer programs, some 22 beginning and advanced career fields, and many occupational certificate programs leading to personal and technical competence. Newest of such programming to win approval is a one-year program leading to licensing as a Registered Nurse.




































































































HOMECOMING 1976-77 "REACH FOR THE STARS"


FOOTBALL



The College of the Canyons' 1976 football team had high hopes of repeating the Conference championship and going to the Mission Bowl as the team had done in 1975. However, the team was beseiged with injuries - eleven players were on the disabled list. The Cougars won their first game - with West Hills - even though star quarterback Mike Flavin was out with a separated shoulder. Four games were lost by a total of seven points. The team did receive some fine honors - fourteen players were placed in four-year institutions on scholarships; Ron Hegge and Roger Slater were named to the second string All State Team; and Dan Kennelly and Ron Hegge were awarded honorable mentions at the All-Americans Awards.


CROSS COUNTRY

COC had the honor of hosting all three of these prestigious events.




MEN'S BASKETBALL





























































Bruce Fortine is director of the Office of Community Services. With his leadership the department provides a number of activities which bring the campus and community in close contact.

During the year over 1500 people participated in 50 non-credit, short-term classes ranging from Accupressure and Psychic Exploration to Basic Freshwater Fishing, Cake Decorating, and Ceramics. Among the most popular were adult Fitness classes, Yoga, Karate, and Learn to Swim.

The department also sponsored Supervision and Management Business Seminars, town meetings on problems of community wide interest, special subject educational field trips for elementary students in cooperation with campus department, the Alcoholic Olympics, and summer programs such as Get High on Life and sports clinics.

Over 650 preschool through high school boys and girls participated in Community Services year-round Gymnastics program offered on an extension basis and on Saturdays at the campus.

More than 200 people per night enjoy Community Services provided Open Recreation. They swim in the pool, lift weights, or play basketball on a non-fee basis.

Many community groups and service organizations utilized through the Office of Community Services campus facilities for special programs of their own.


























