stated Dr. William Banowsky, president of Pepperdine University and keynote speaker at Saugus' dedication, May 6, 1975. Education was the core of the American Dream, which vanished during the 1960's. Dr. Banowsky feels that the youth of today, with a realistic, not a perfectionistic view of the world, are reviving the hope of the American Dream. His charge to Saugus was to "preserve freedom of the individual and the soul of education."

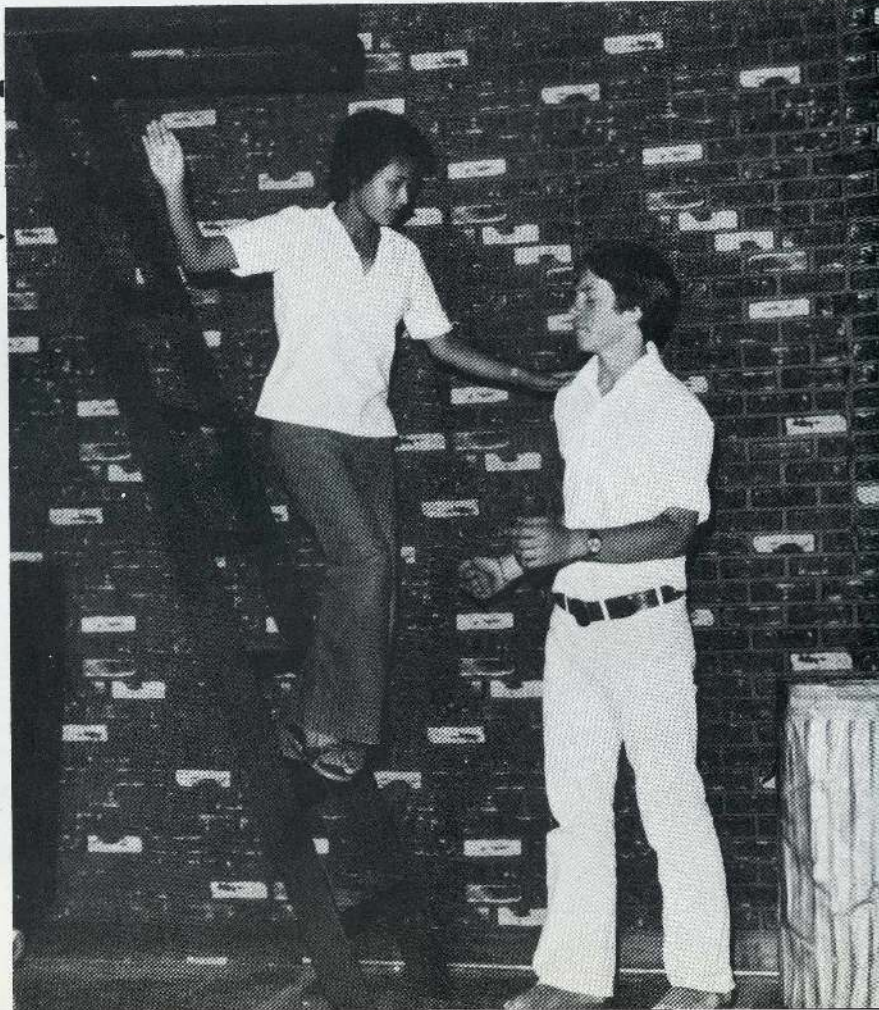
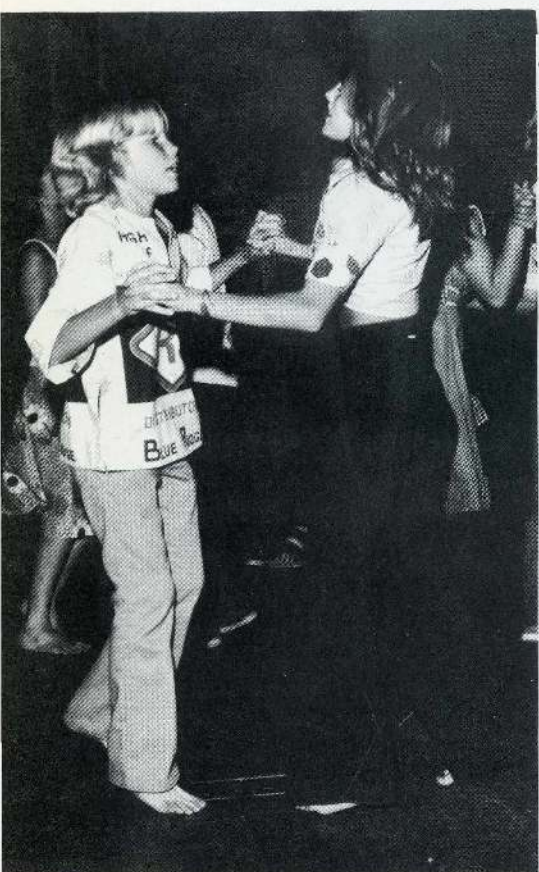
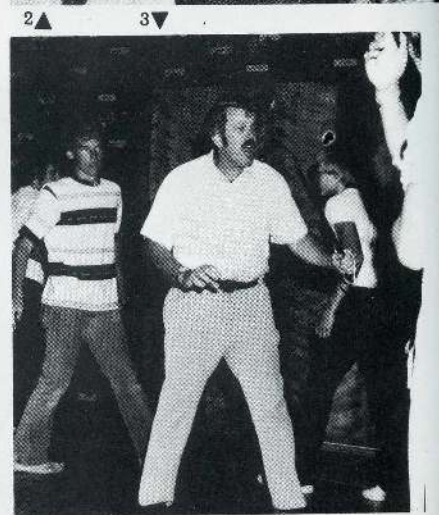
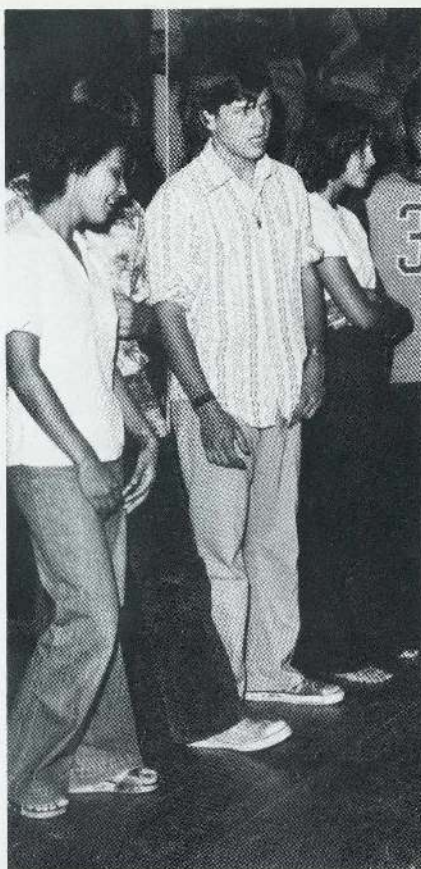
Love destroyed by racial prejudice

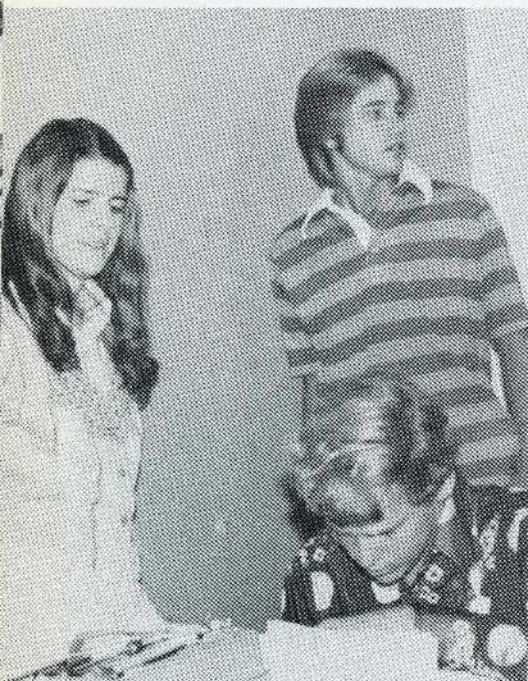
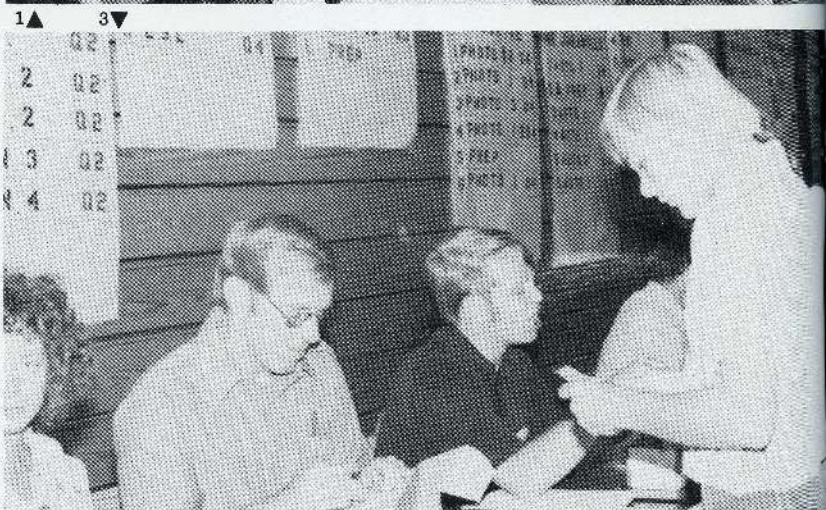
Saugus Shuffle— individual registration

Held the week before classes began, students were able to purchase ASB cards, yearbooks, and have ID pictures taken while at school to register.

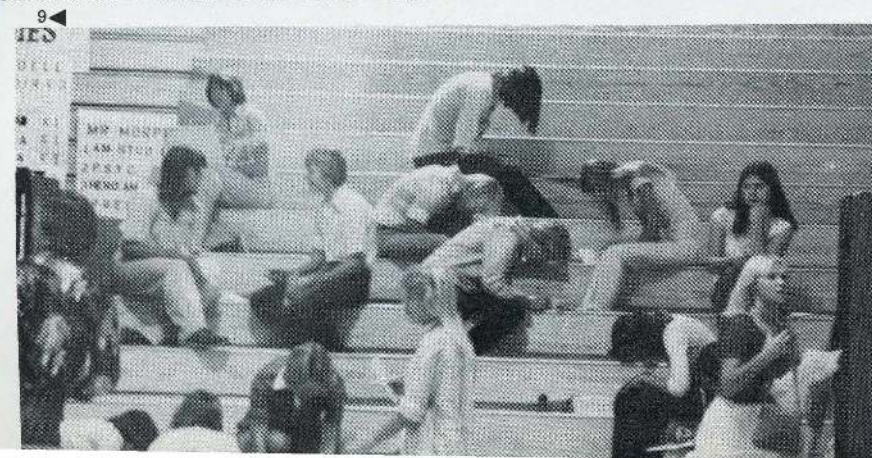
Done in September on a trial basis, the Shuffle was so well received that it was repeated in February.

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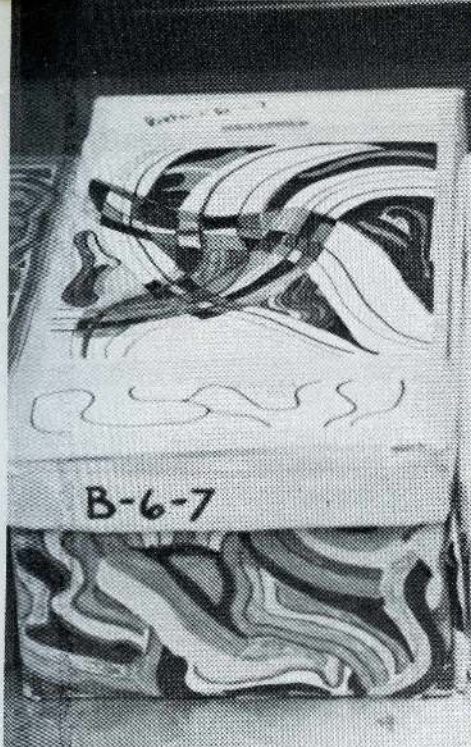

BIPS? Huh? What in the world . . . ? What IS a BIPS?

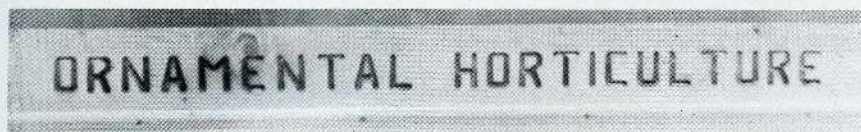
On Monday, January 24, a Centurion special came to life - BIPS. BIPS stands for the Best of Introduction to Physical Science (Best of IPS).

A pot luck lunch was served.

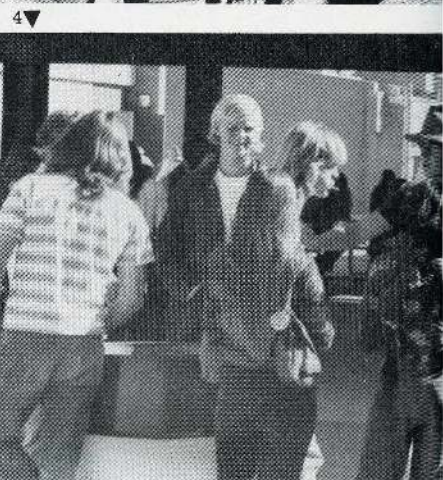

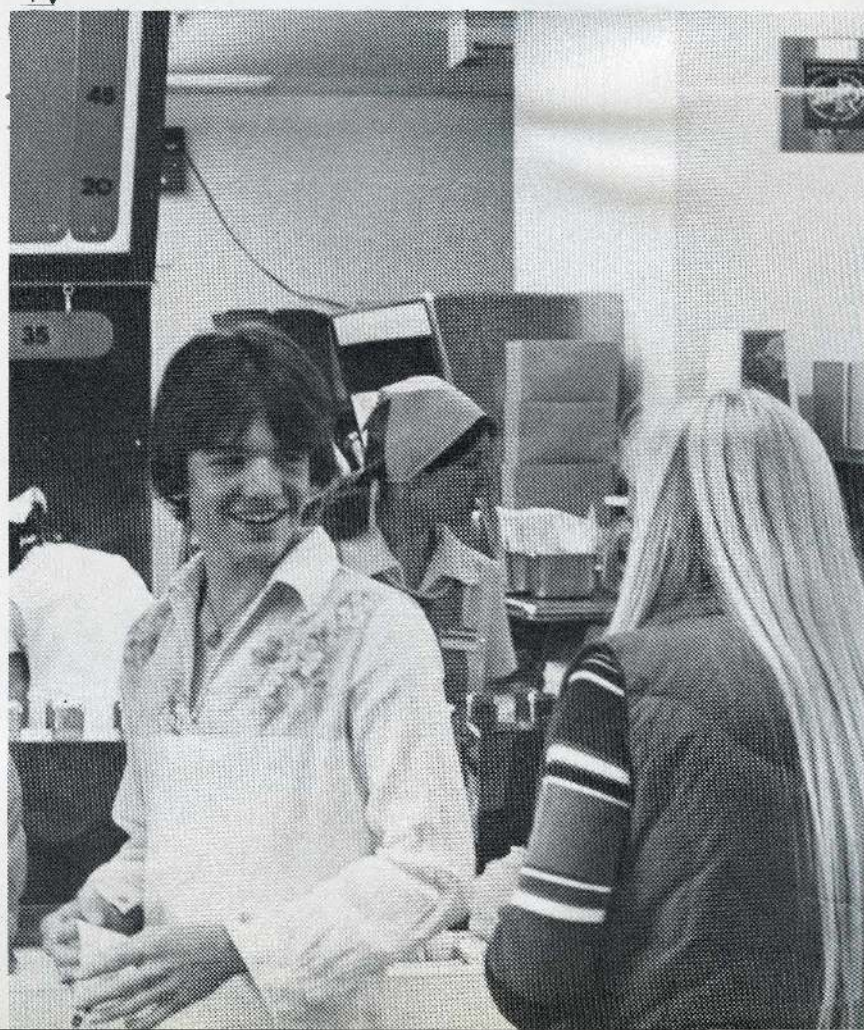

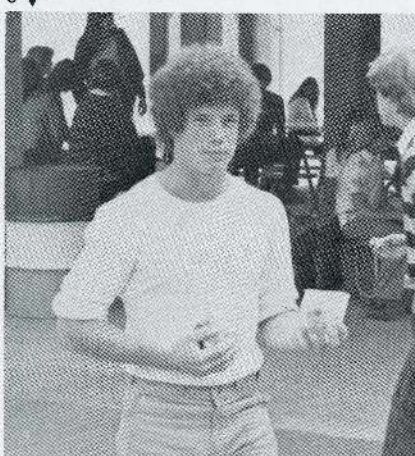

Hard work and high hopes paid off

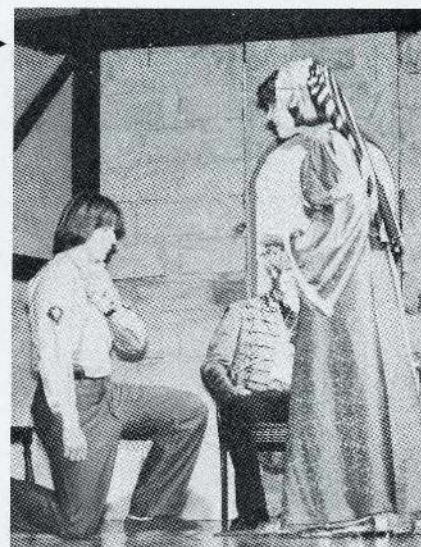

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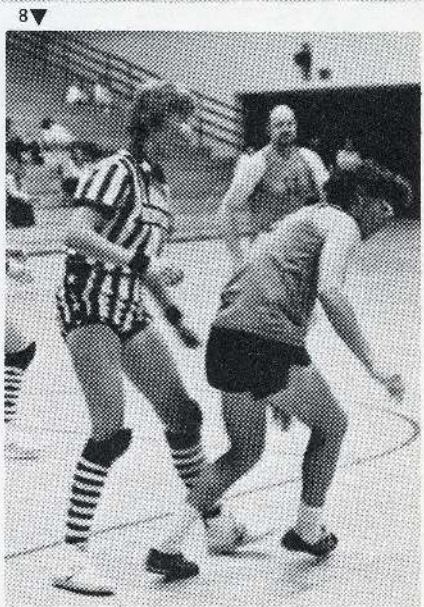

The first rung on the ladder to the #2 spot was Bishop. Traveling 5 hours, Saugus came through with a 67-71 victory. Gary Luster made 34 points, an outstanding game. Bob Skophammer had 17 points and 11 rebounds. Coach Fred Crummett felt both Bob and Gary had great games.

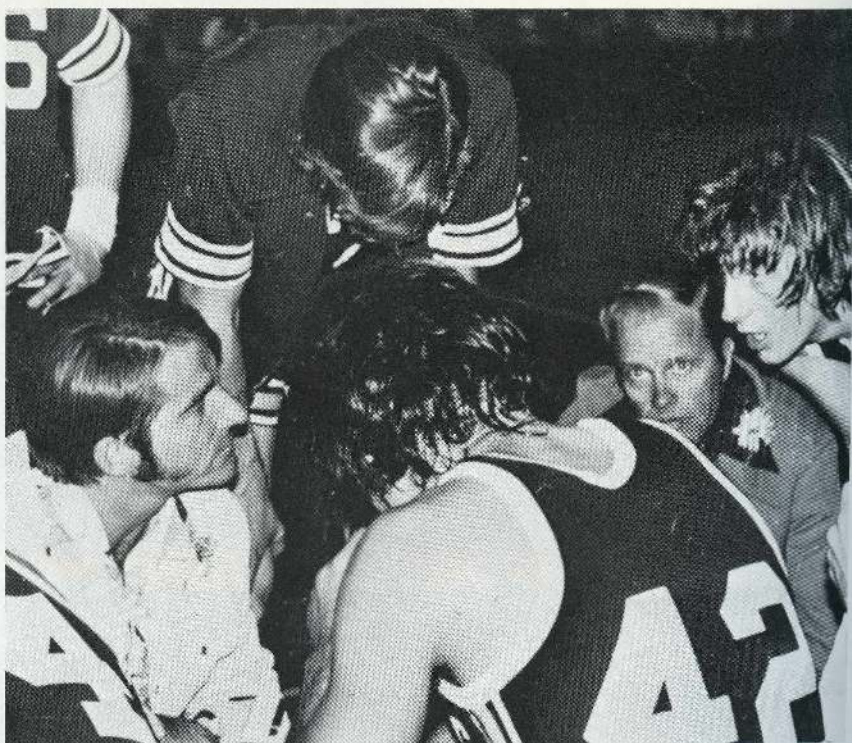
Hosting the next game, Saugus met Bishop Diego. Coach Crummett said the key to this game was that the team was very unselfish. Richard Walsh had 12 assists, responsible for 24 points. "That's a mark of a good team, when they put the team as a whole before themselves," stated Crummett.

Winning these first two games, Saugus earned their place in the semi-finals which were held at the COC gym. Their third opponent was Morro Bay. Again Saugus came out victorious, 65-50. "It was a very exciting game. Playing very well offensively and defensively were Jerry Tucker and Richard Walsh. Together they put in 33 points compared to Morro Bay's guards with 4," said Coach Crummett.

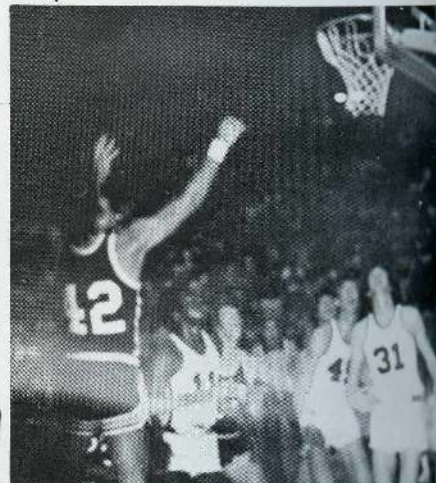
The CIF Championship game was against Perris at the Long Beach Sports arena. Saugus was the first Santa Clarita Valley school to have a team make it to the CIF finals. "Saugus played very well, as a whole, although they did not play one of their best games, missing layups during the game," reviewed Coach Crummett.

Saugus was led by Jerry Tucker and Gary Luster's 20 and 16 points respectively. The final score was Perris 60 - Saugus 54.

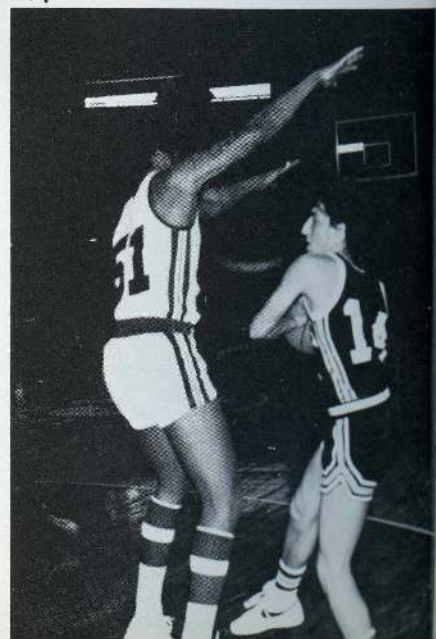

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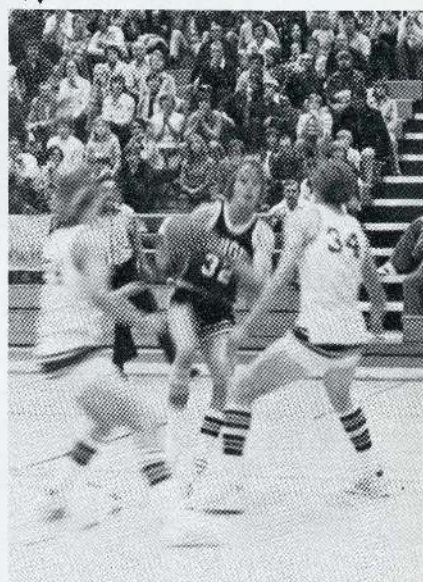


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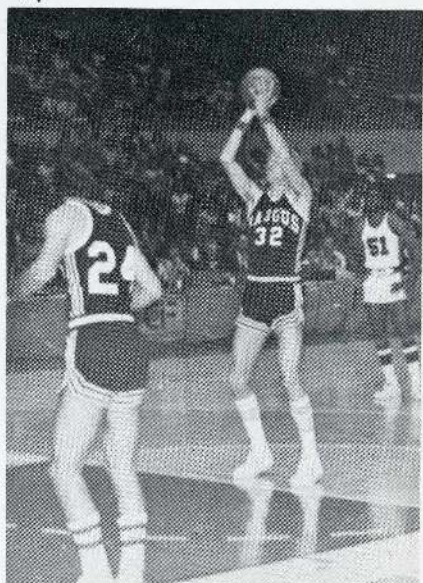

The evening of presentations was spiced with a variety of entertainment features.

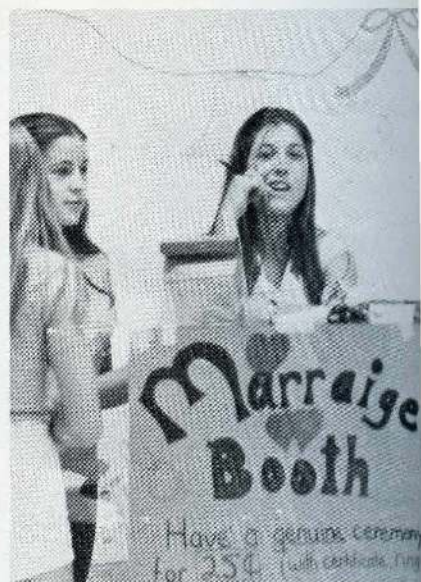

The evening closed with an outstanding solo by Mr. Murdock - "Love Walked In" - who was accompanied by the Stage Band.



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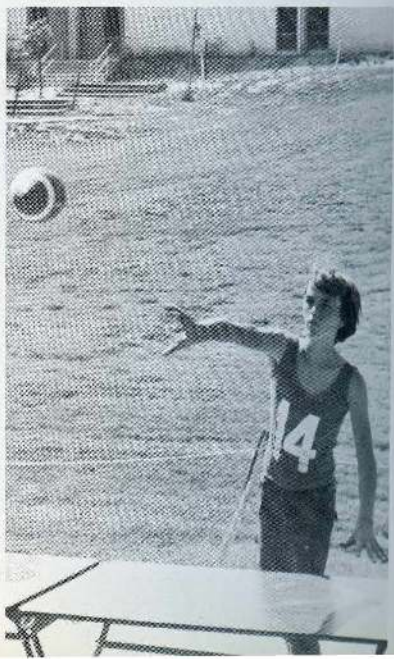

The ASB put together the carnival for all the clubs and organizations to make some money for future use.





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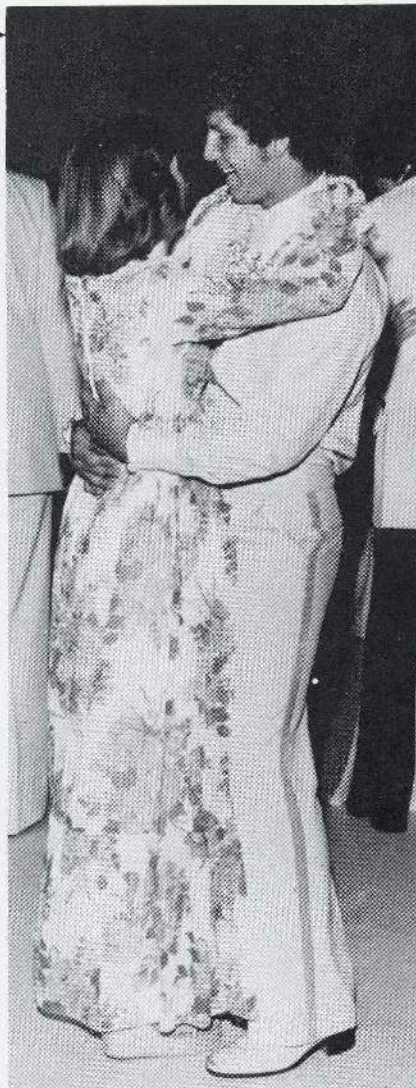

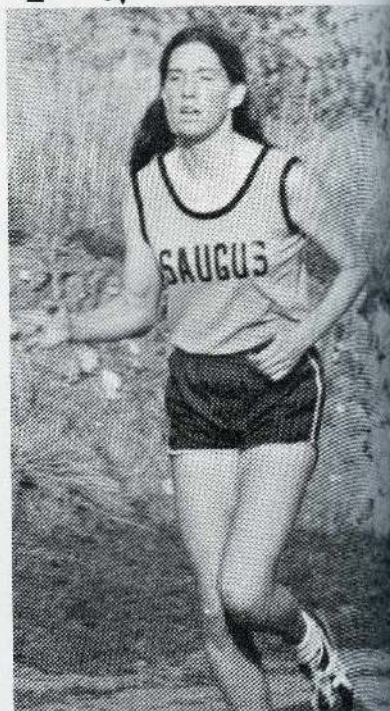
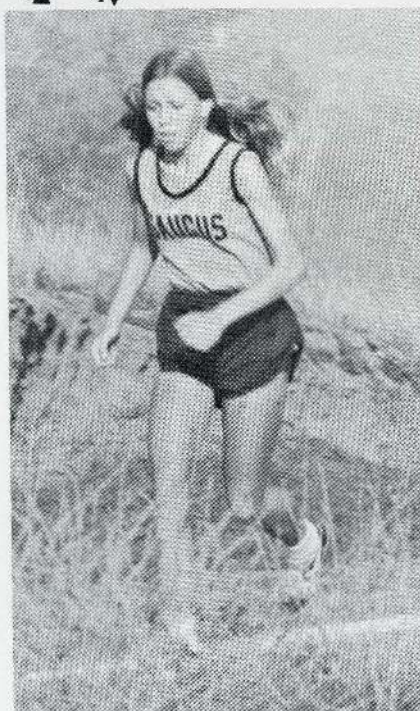




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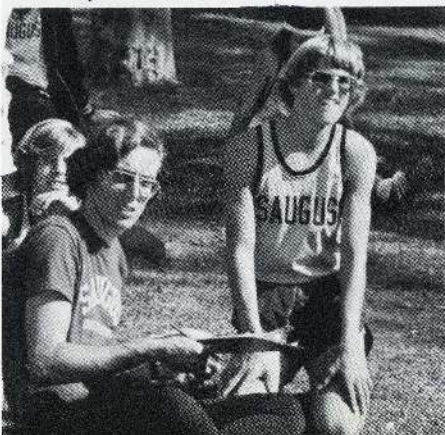




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CIF was the goal of seven varsity girls

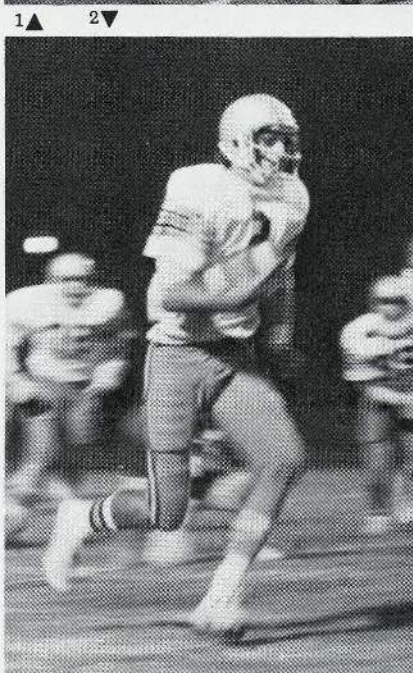
Saugus' first varsity football team

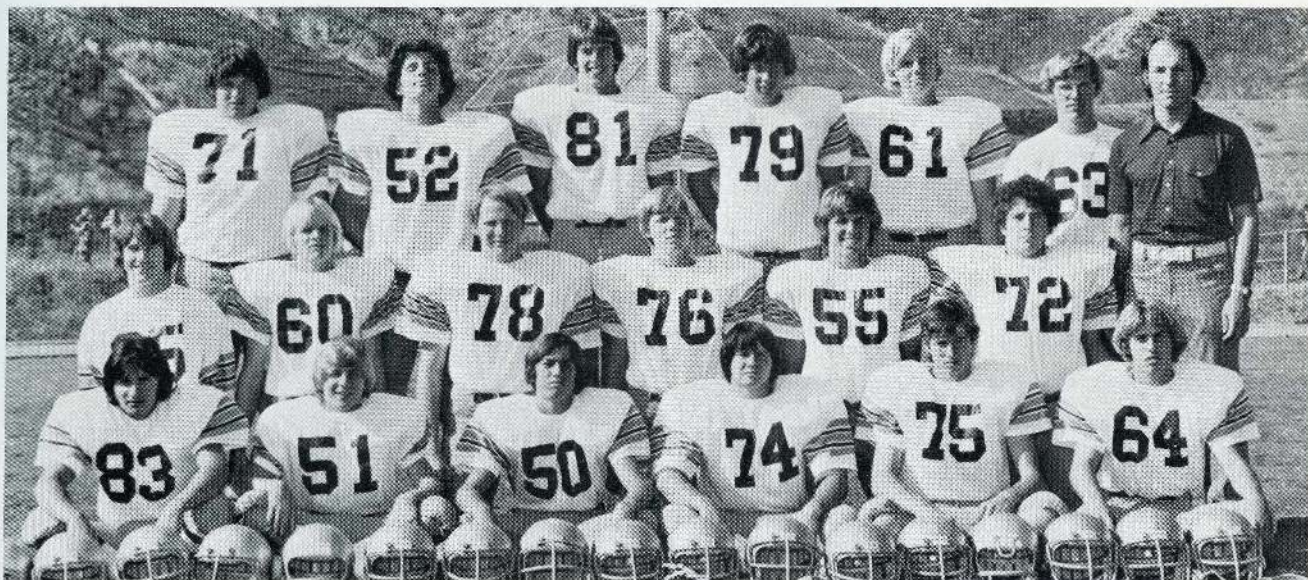
The coaches agreed the team did a good job under the circumstances. "The guys really enjoyed playing football," commented Coach Hansen.

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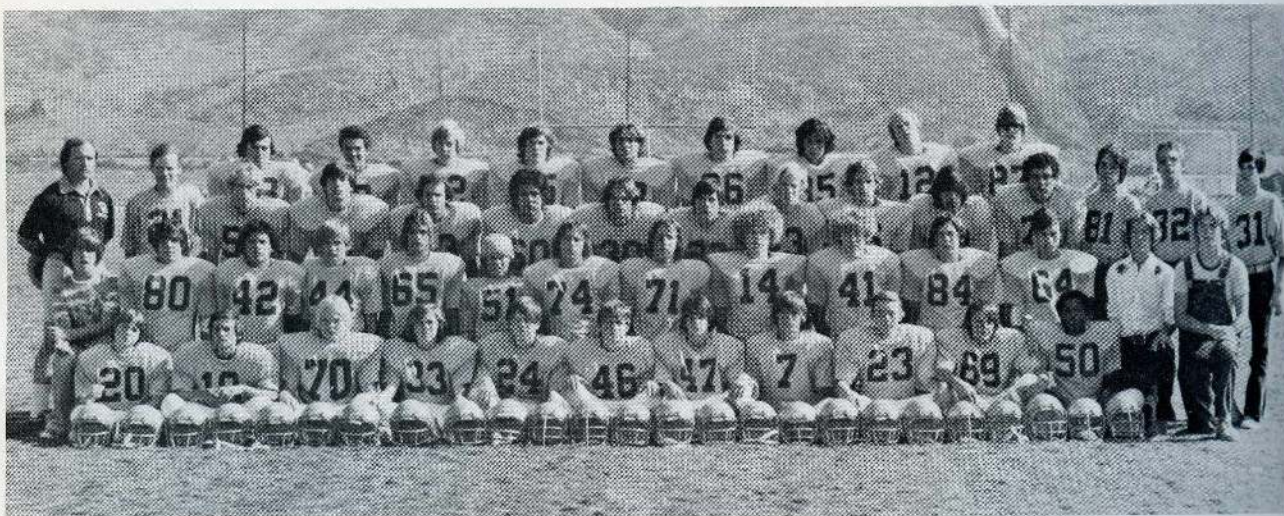

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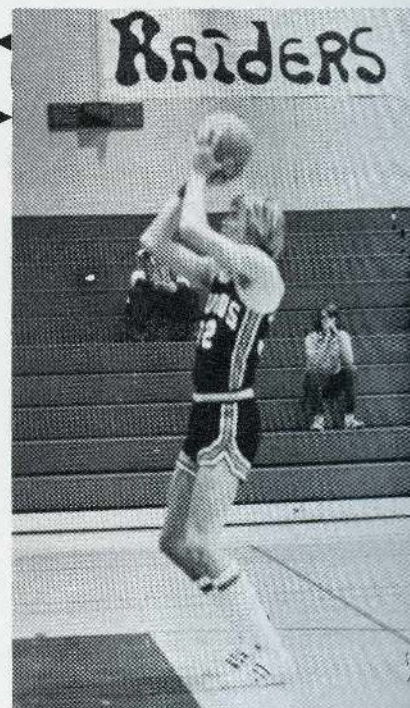

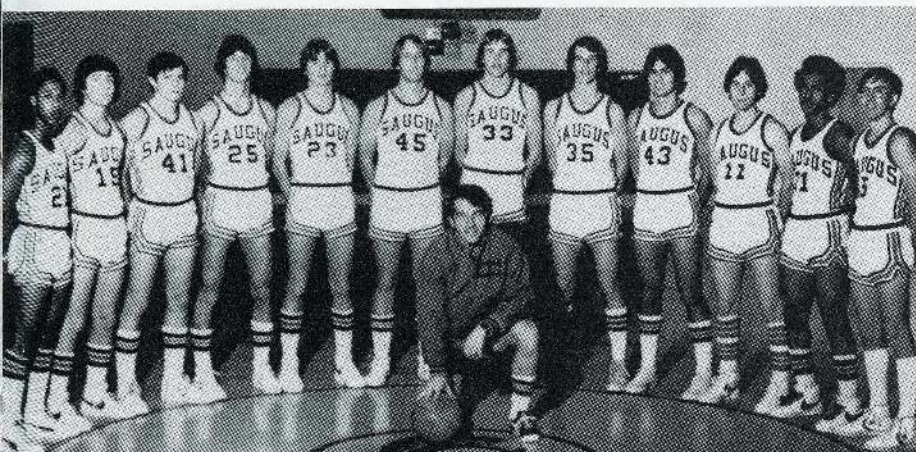


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First season for varsity basketball

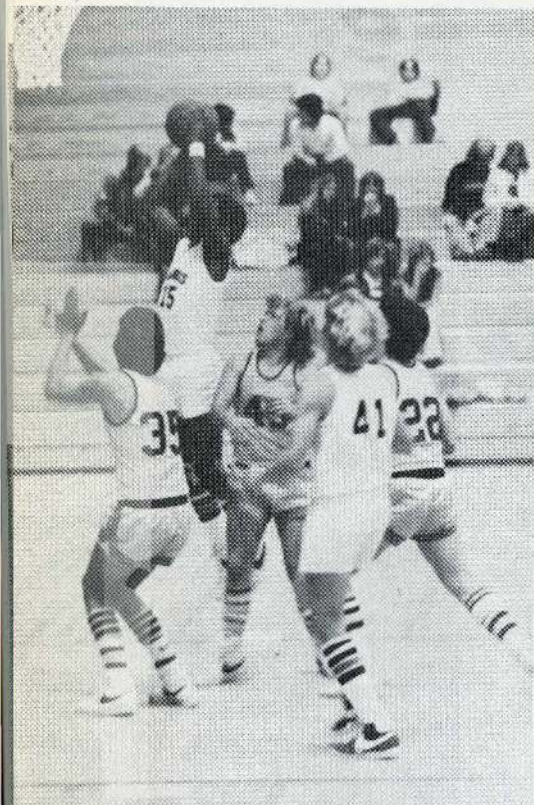

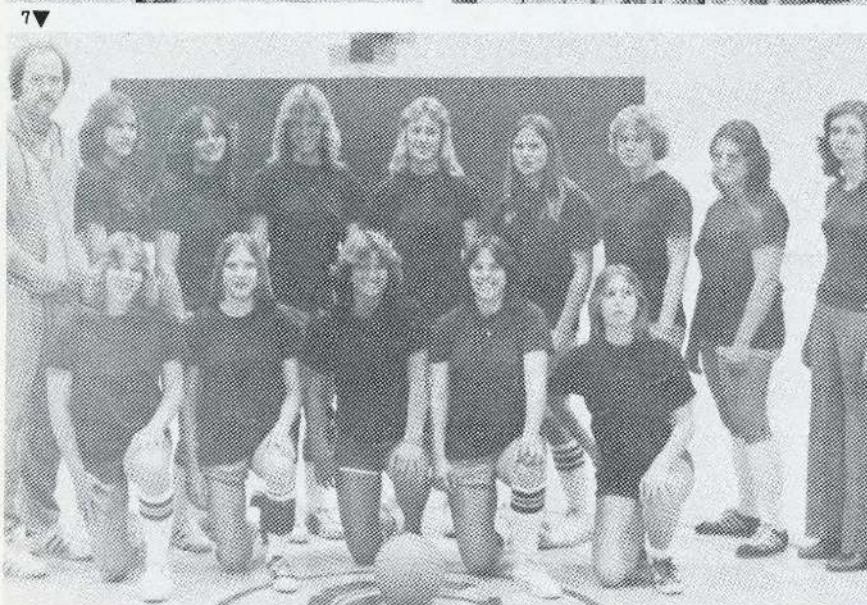
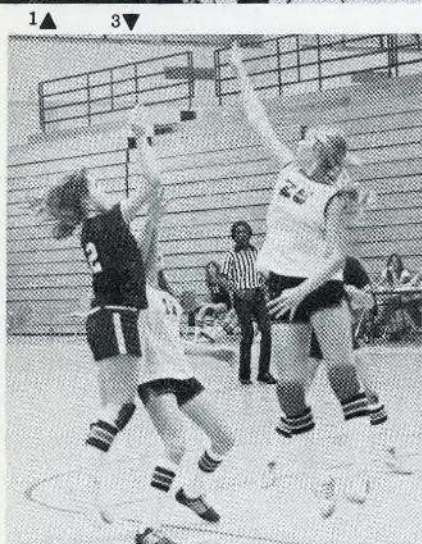

hosted new additions

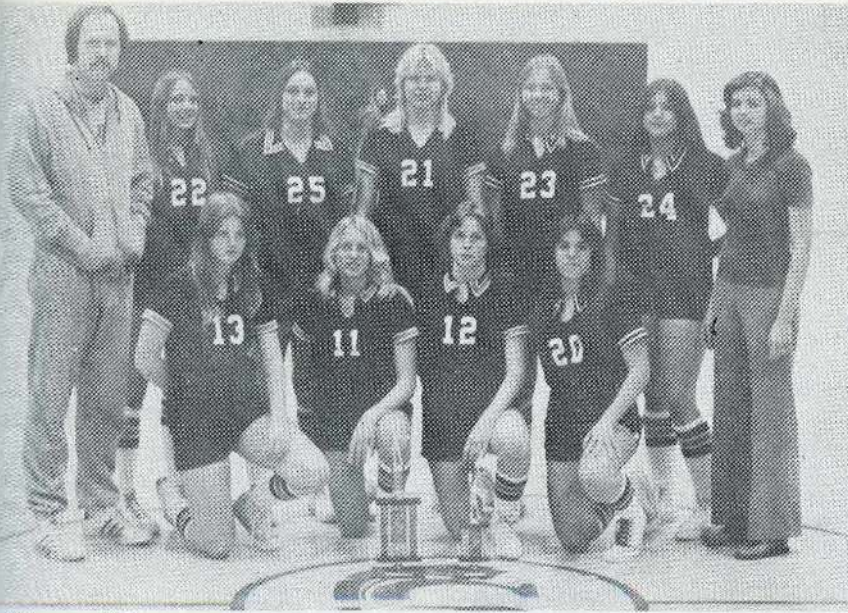

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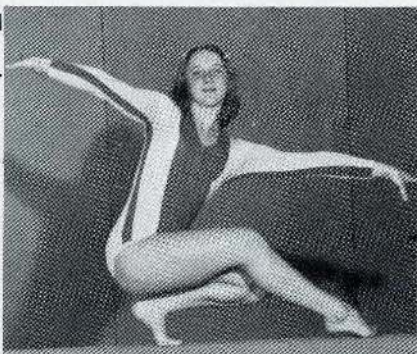
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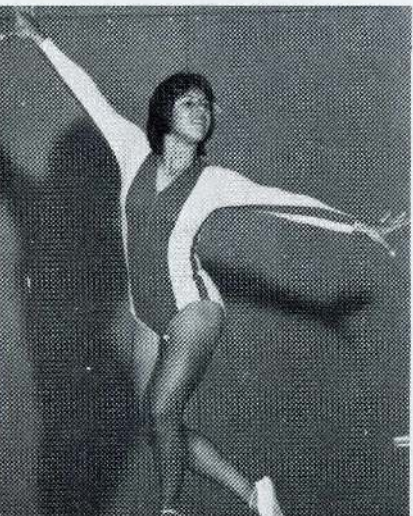
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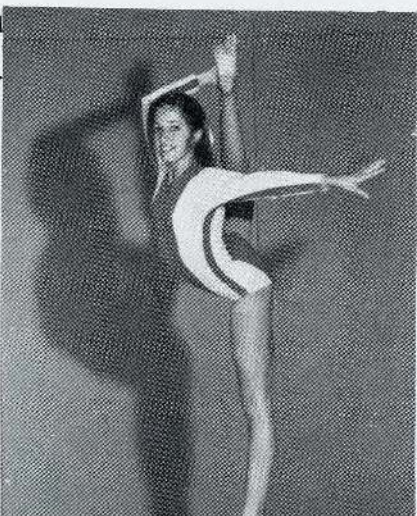
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Long hours of practice paid off

Maria Green also went to CIF first round pre-lim play. Although she lost, she represented Saugus well.



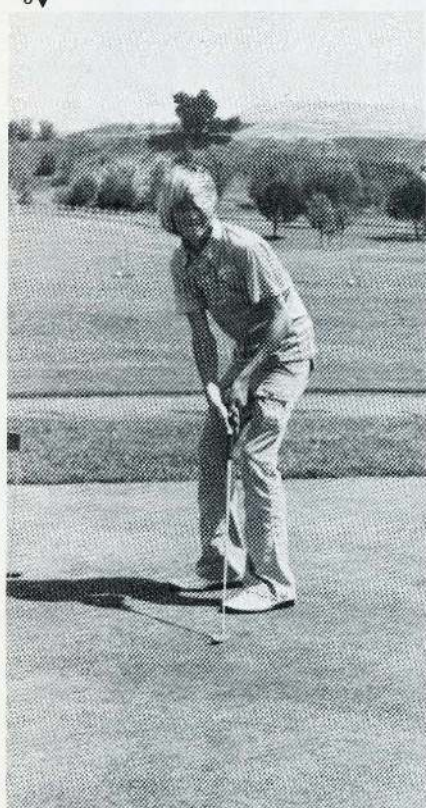

Mr. Lynn Lozar was in charge of the work experience program which helped students find jobs. They must attend a class during lunch so that they will receive credit for working.

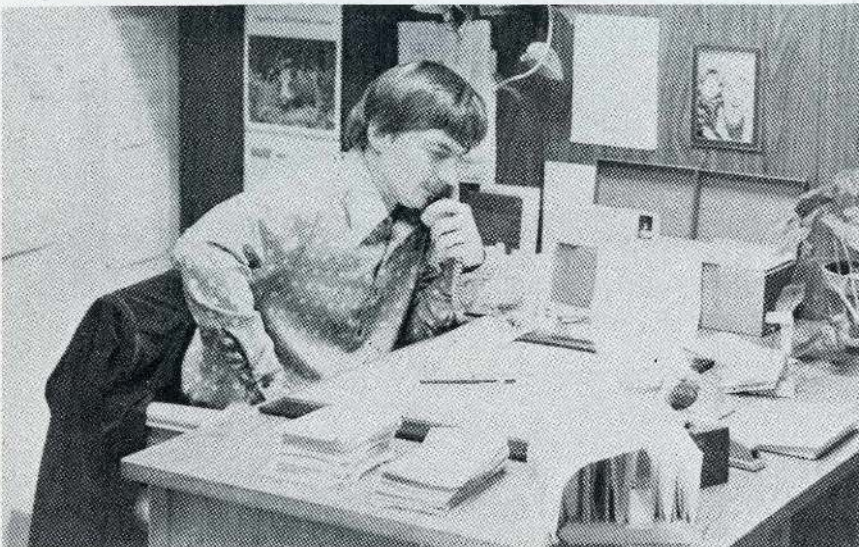

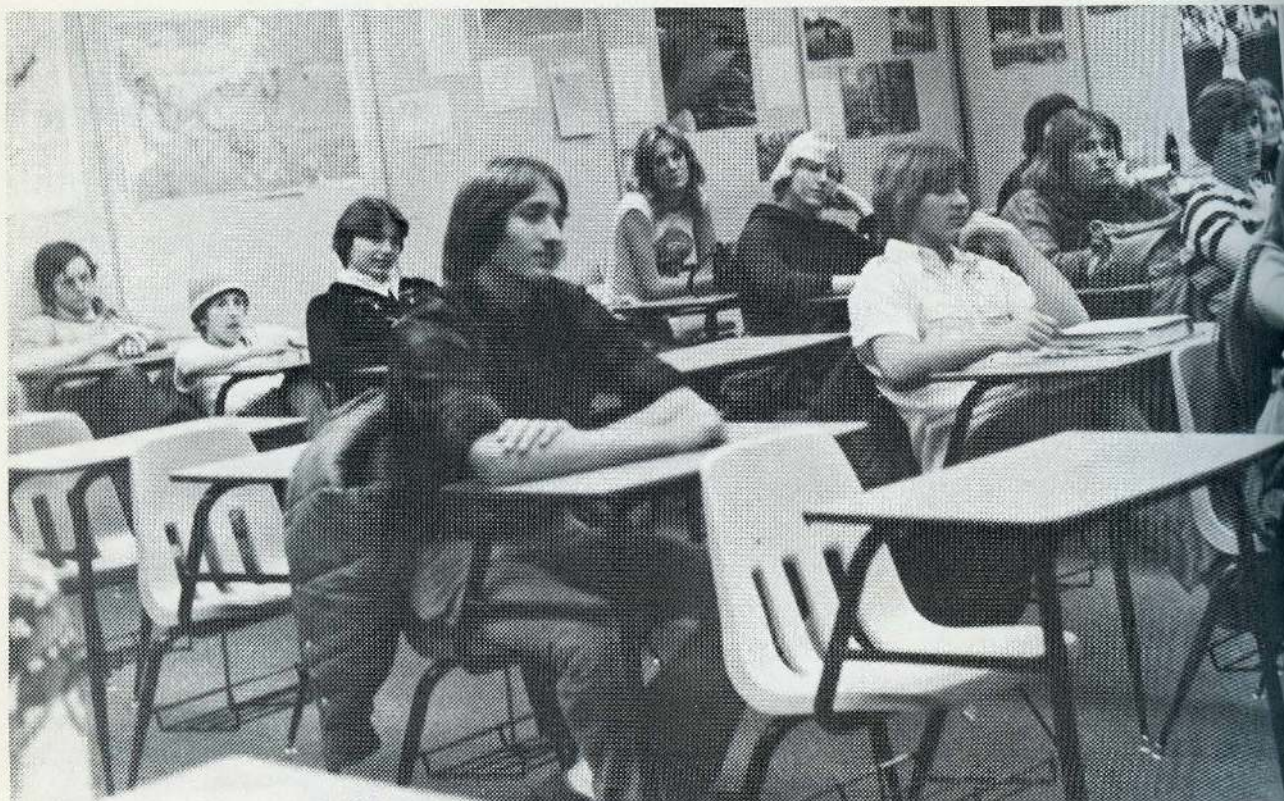

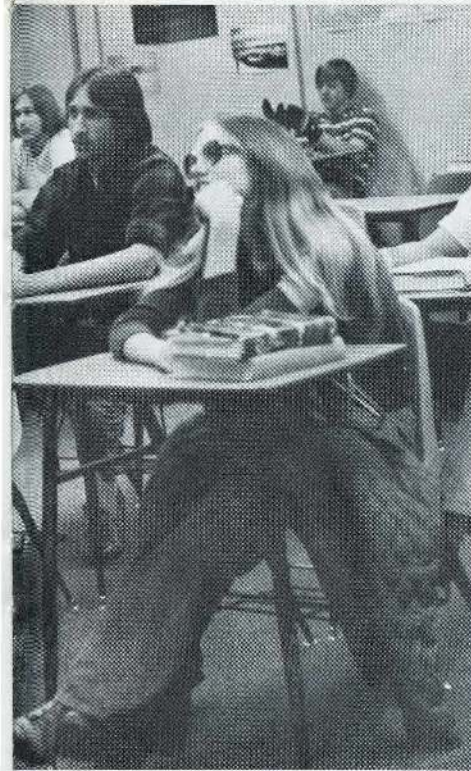
whatever their choice, students could find classes with meaning for their futures in the English, Social Studies, and Foreign Language departments.

In the area of Social Studies, Mr. Ed Morphis, chairman, students met programs like Psychology and the American Indian.

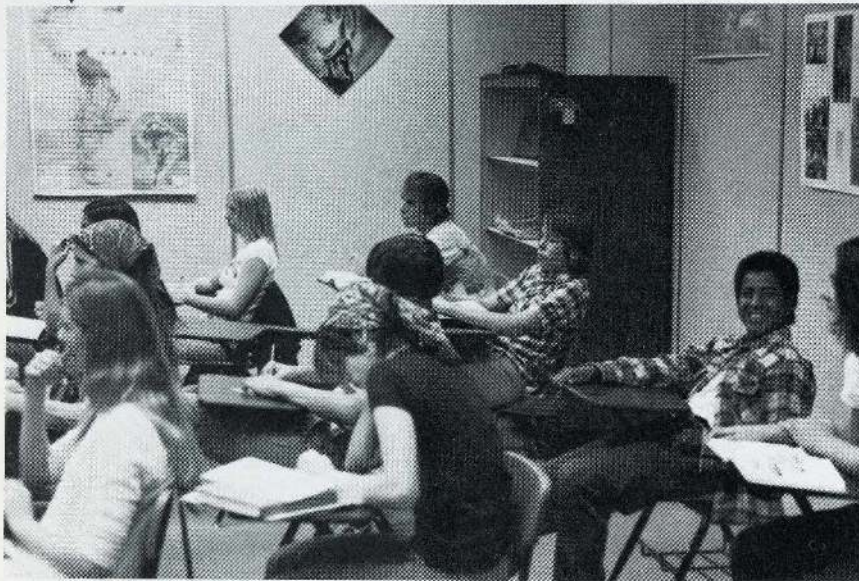
Foreign language added more advanced classes, but continued to offer selections only in Spanish and French.



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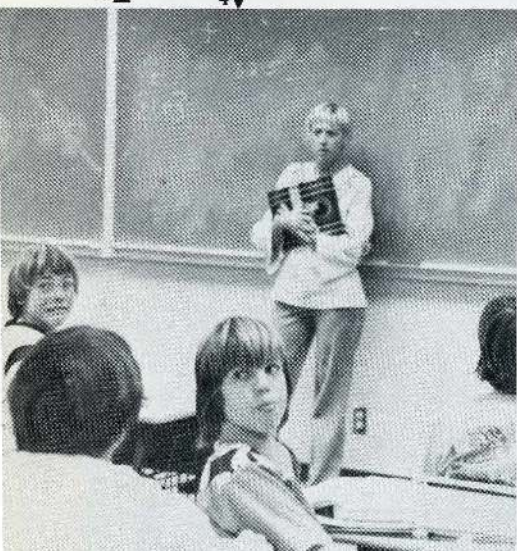
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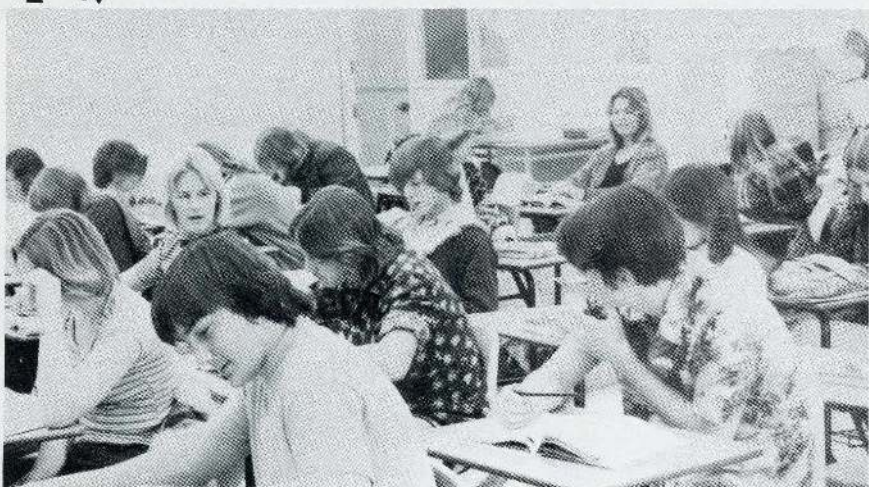


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Numbers in many varied forms appear

Science developed new courses, and an enjoy-science attitude that led to special programs like BIPS. Mr. Wally Prella was head of the department.

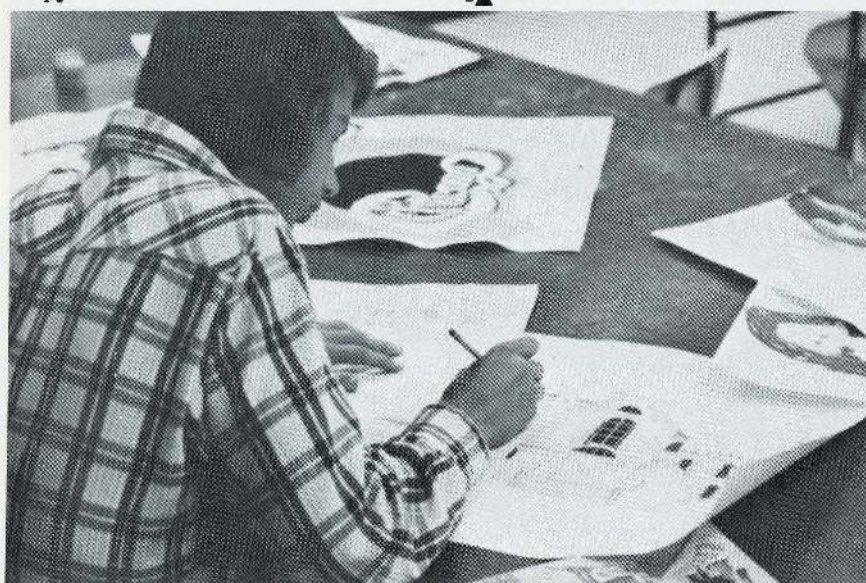

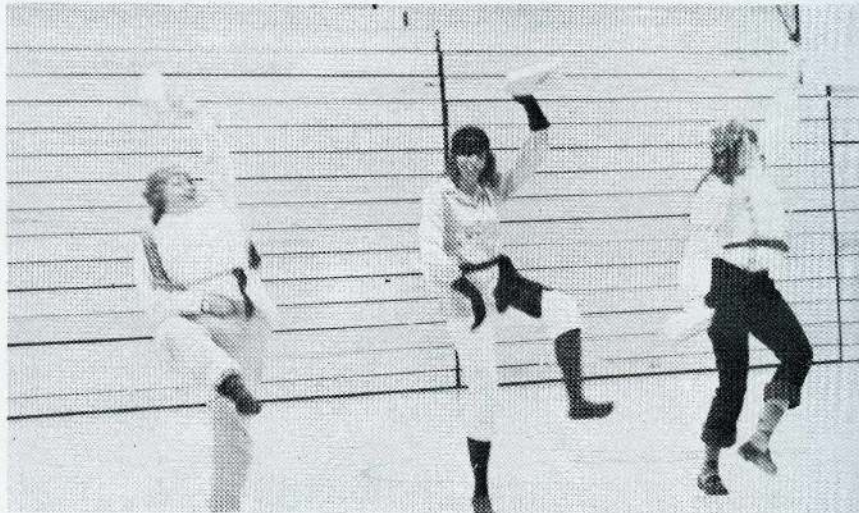
were the themes for this year's drill team. Working under the direction of a new advisor, Ms. Jill Taniguchi, the team developed a strong bond of concern and understanding for each other.

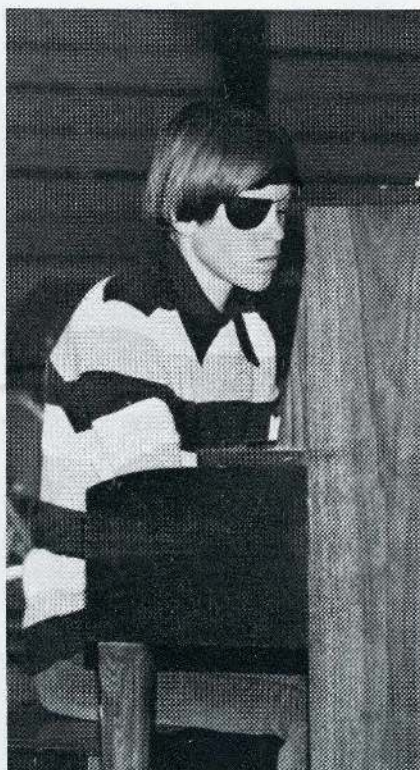

Journalism I was for students to learn how to develop newspaper writing skills.

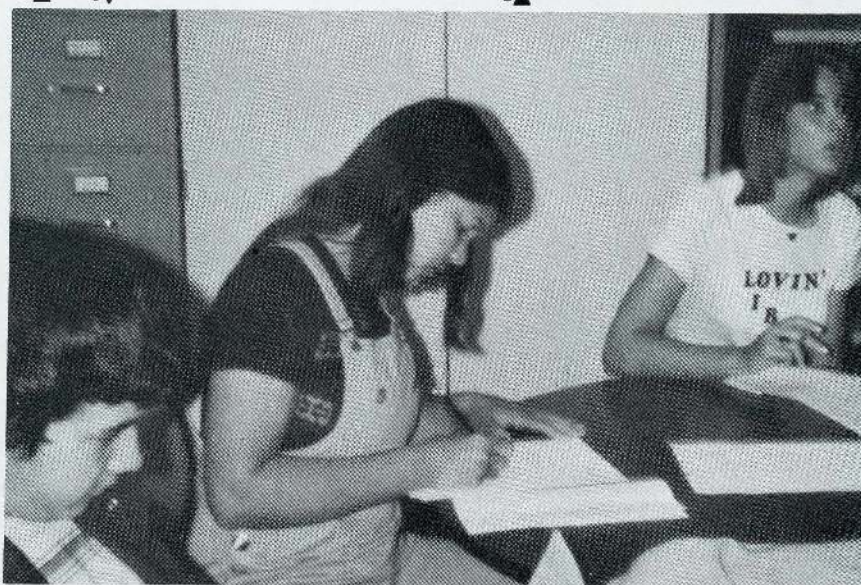

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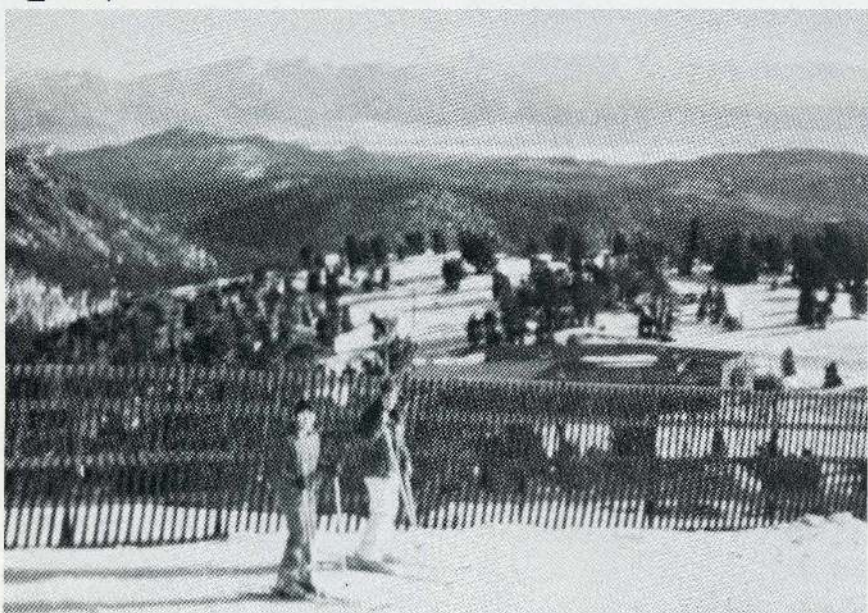
